The 31st National Cursillo® Encounter -2nd Virtual Encounter 2021 was an inspiring event attended by many. The actual number may be hard to estimate as many signed on as couples or even in small groups!

We began with a special letter from, Archbishop Gómez is the Archbishop of Los Angeles and President of the USCCB. He sent a letter as he was unable to attend at the last minute. Archbishop stressed in the letter that "friendship is key on our journey with Christ." It was this – friendship – that was the emphasis of the Encounter, titled United in Friendship.

The Encounter was gifted with excellent Spiritual and Lay Rollos. Some highlights follow:

- Fr. Alex Waraksa, NACG Spiritual Advisor, reminds us of Jn. 15:14-15 where Jesus tells us "No longer do I call you slaves, for the slave does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, because all things that I have heard from My Father I have made known to you." Following this gift of friendship there is a further call in Jn. 15: 17 "This I command you, that you love one another." Fr. Alex went on to say that Christian charity leads one into the desire to share this love with others that is, to evangelize. Our Charism gives us confidence to evangelize through continued conversion and through friendship.
- In our Charism, we remember that God in Christ loves us whether we are worthy or unworthy. Perhaps this brings to mind our commitment when we received our pilgrim cross: "Christ is counting on you..... and I on Him."
- Manuel Fernandez Jorda, known as Minolo, joined us from Majorca. In his laity Rollo entitled
  Christ, Person, Friendship, Minolo wanted to stress the word friendship not just friend.
  Friendship is an attitude that allows us to touch others.
  It is this attitude of friendship that drives the movement, as we all have diverse backgrounds and interests. Most importantly is our shared friendship with Jesus Christ.

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### "Faith Over Fear."

About six weeks ago, my neighbor surprised me with a basket containing a few miscellaneous gift items, among them a T-shirt emblazoned with "Faith Over Fear." It was so sweet of her, and I know she is a faithfilled woman, but that meme didn't especially speak to me at the time. A few weeks later we learned that our daughter had been diagnosed with Stage 3 melanoma, and suddenly that shirt has a relevance I could never have imagined. It got me to thinking that my neighbor had unwittingly acted as God's messenger, preparing me for a time when fear could easily engulf me. If you've ever had to endure struggles and difficulties, (and who hasn't?) you undoubtedly called on God to heal a family member, to see you through financial hardships, to find your son a job, to comfort a friend who grieves the loss of a spouse or child, or to shore up a failing marriage. Sometimes we must face unbearable situations, but can we ever do it without fear? I've often said that without faith in our God, I could never get through tough times. When life hands us something

so dark, something that is out of our control, that's when faith truly becomes a lifesaver. Faith is what keeps us going when we cannot speak, cannot think, cannot even pray. Faith is a gift that keeps us sane, allows us to think of others, and protects us from despair. Faith in a loving God who has our best interest at heart does not come easy when our life is a train wreck. That's when others become messengers of hope. Friends and family take on a special task of holding us up, praying when we cannot, comforting when we are inconsolable. Knowing they are supporting us, we are able to breathe again, to get up in the morning, to see beauty again and take delight again in simple pleasures. Faith crushes fear and allows us to acknowledge that God DOES have our best interest at heart, that He is eternal, always with us and always true to his Word. So when you see me wearing my shirt that says "Faith Over Fear" know that, though we don't know how our daughter's story will turn out, and though we can't deny some fearful thoughts, we are confident that God is with us through this. And that fear will not win this war!
