**GOING "LIST-LESS" THIS CHRISTMAS** 

Many of us live by lists: shopping lists, "things-to-do" lists, lists of dates and schedules. Checking off items on a list gives us some assurance that we're in control of things.

#### Christmas, of course, is the ultimate season of lists.

Kim Lawrence is a mom who operates on lists. But one year she began compiling her Christmas lists of presents to buy, goodies to bake, decorations to put up, and the endless tasks and deadlines — and it overwhelmed her. No, she realized, this is not what Christmas is supposed to be.

"I looked longingly at our living room lit by the soft glow of the tree. I wanted time to sit in that room, snuggle with my kids, drink eggnog with my husband, and watch a holiday movie. I couldn't ever seem to get there. It wasn't on a list."

#### Kim shared her anxieties with her parish priest.

"What he said is a lesson that will stay with me. He told me to think like a child during the holidays. Rather than worrying about what needed to be bought, cooked, baked, and wrapped, instead try to see the season through the eyes of my children. They don't make lists. They know instinctively what is important to them. They'll sit every night and look at the ornaments on the tree. They notice all the holiday lights on all of the houses we pass. On Sundays, they walk up to and ask questions about the life-size manger outside our church.

"I realize I can't live completely list-free. There are things I have to remember, and if writing them down helps, that's OK. But I also realize that not everything has to be remembered, not everything has to be on a list, and fewer lists mean more time to create those meaningful moments we cherish this time of year. So, list-free this Christmas? I'm crumpling my paper now."

In the midst of our endless Christmas "list-making," John the Baptizer appeared in our Advent readings proclaiming the true meaning of Christmas: the dawning of the reign of God, filled with new possibilities to create a more just, a more joyful, a more hope-filled world. Christmas calls us to follow a star outside our own self-centered orbit, to make our way to a poor stable beyond just our own door, to a peace that embraces more than just our own happiness.

So, as Kim Lawrence discovered with her family, let's reclaim the meaning of Christmas in every dimension of our holiday celebrations: let our lights proclaim the dawning of Christ our light; let our cards proclaim the good news of the angels that God is in our midst; let our gift-giving reflect the compassion and generosity of the God who loves us enough to become one of us; let our hospitality mirror God's embrace of all his children.
