Jesus told a parable to the Pharisees. "Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit?"

Although Pharisees have long since disappeared from history, there are many who are blinded by pride, prejudice and self-righteousness. Spiritual blindness has become very common in our times. Such blindness refuses to see the truths of God's revelation. This blindness refuses even to admit that God or Christ exists. In their pride, the spiritually blind claim that everything ends with death and that there is no life after death. They propagate their errors and accuse believers of childish naivete and folly. They ignore the gifts of

the intellect we all possess.

God's revelation through Christ informs us that there is a future life awaiting us in which our spiritual faculties and our transformed bodies will be fully and fittingly glorified. According to Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, the miracle of the healing of the blind man is a sign that Christ wants not only to give us sight, but also to open our interior vision, so that our faith may become ever deeper and we may recognize Him as our only Savior. He illuminates all that is dark in life and leads men and women to live as "children of the light."



Deacon Rick was born in Tokyo, Japan, into a military family that traveled the world. To follow in his family's footsteps, he enlisted in the United States Army and became a helicopter pilot. During his time in the military he received several commendations, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star medal and the Purple Heart, to name a few. Serving for over 20 years Rick did several foreign tours of duty, including Vietnam. He retired from Fort Rucker as a CW4 and settled his family in Pinckard, Alabama. For the next 20 years Rick and his wife Kitty dedicated themselves to the service of our Lord at St. Columba Catholic Church in Dothan. He became a deacon and later became the Spiritual Director of the Mobile Cursillo. He served for the last two years at St. John's Catholic Church in Ozark.

Deacon Rick was a wonderful homilist; to this day, I remember well one of his talks. He told about a priest from St. Columba who was standing in line at the bank on a Monday morning with the weekend's collection money in hand and wearing his collar. When he felt a tap on his back, he turned and a little gray-haired woman asked, "Do you people believe the Bible?" At that the priest politely said to her, "Yes, ma'am, we wrote it." With that, the lady turned on her heels and walked out of the bank.

Having a servant's heart, Deacon Rick loved giving his time to his community and those in need. His funeral Mass was held at St. Columba Church in Dothan. Msgr Patrick Gallagher presided and his homily was a tribute to Deacon Rick's life of service. Three priests concelebrated, with five deacons and five altar servers, and the church was filled with those whose lives he touched.
